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

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

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

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From the Principal's Desk

As we move into the final stages of 2020, there is a lot to be excited about at TAS, now and in the future. Our new business plan commences in 2021, with lower fees and a more affordable bus service. Our Year 12 students have performed very well in their assessments and we look forward to the release of Year 12 results later in December.

As you may be aware, we are introducing a new school uniform guide across 2021, with some changes to parts of the uniform. We are currently receiving feedback on our proposed uniform upgrades from a variety of sources, and we are excited to be able to make changes to meet the requests of many of our families. Just a reminder: the long, grey boys' socks are no longer to be worn. Short green TAS socks should be worn with the day uniform.

I have met and interviewed a large number of prospective families over the last couple of months wanting to enroll their child at TAS, and it is an enjoyable experience to be asked about our wonderful school by parents who are seeking a better educational experience for their child. He will commence next year and modify his current role (renamed as Head of Teaching and Learning) and combine it with the role of Deputy Principal. I am also pleased to announce the appointment of Ms Joanna Baker as Head of Secondary School. Ms Baker's role focuses on building the culture, wellbeing and systems of our Secondary School.

As we break for the holidays, it is worth remembering that an important birthday takes place over this time. CAIRNS youngster Adeepa Keerthirathne is taking the junior table tennis world by storm. The 11-year-old student from Trinity Anglican School recently competed at the Queensland Junior Table Tennis Championships,

as well as regional competitions in Mackay and Townsville, where he claimed a total of seven medals. His outstanding success means Adeepa has now qualified to compete at the national championships, which will be held next year. "It was my first time playing in

these tournaments, it felt good, I felt ready," he said. "I've been playing for about five years and it's pretty competitive." Adeepa said he trained about two days a week and would ramp that up ahead of competitions. "You've got to have good hand-eye

co-ordination and be consistent with your shots. Just concentrate on the ball," he said. Adeepa also played in two doubles rounds with fellow classmate Shivansh Pandey at the state junior championships, taking home two silver medals.

From little things big things grow

AN 11-YEAR project to transform neglected cane land into a multi-use space for students and a verdant wildlife corridor has come to fruition. Trinity Anglican School (TAS) senior student Harry Pozzi was in year 1 when his father, Dr Rob Pozzi, along with fellow parent Mick O'Rielly, spearheaded the revegetation

of Sawpit Gully. The 20ha site, which is adjacent to the White Rock school, had succumbed to weeds until a collaborative effort by parents, students, conservation groups and Cairns Regional Council plus funding from the Federal Government's Caring for Country program set about revegetating the area with annual tree planting events. The goal was set in 2009 to plant 10,000 trees to transform the space and it's a mammoth effort that the school accomplished in recent days. Sawpit Gully is now a space where students are taken to study everything from native plants to water quality and carbon sequestration. During this year's pandemic restrictions, the space has been used by the school's outdoor education department.

SPEEDY TEEN'S TOKYO DREAM

A CAIRNS swimmer is eyeing off a spot at the Tokyo Olympics after a personal best earned him the title of the fastest 13-year-old in Australia's history.

Ike Martinez broke a 19-year Australian swimming record for 200m butterfly at the FNQ long course championships earlier this year, with a time of 2:08.7.

He has now broken the record again, swimming 2:06 in the event

at the recent Marlin Coast Long Course Championships.

The record-breaking swim has earned him a spot at the Olympic trials in June next year.

Ike started competitive swimming about three years ago and said he was excited, but nervous to be competing against Australia's best.

"It would be pretty awesome competing for Australia," he said. "I'm pretty nervous but ultimately it's a good experience."

"My ultimate goal is to break a world record one day."

The Year 8 Trinity Anglican School (TAS) student and swimming club member will also compete at the state championships in Brisbane in December.

"I've been training hard for that to get ready," he said. "I train about eight sessions a week, in the morning and afternoon."

Ike was recently named FNQ swimmer of the year.

Ponytail Project

Girls chop 'n' change for a good cause

THREE Trinity Anglican School Year 12 students gave their hair the chop on Monday, but it was much more than just a new hairdo.

Alana Hearn 18, Layla Parker, 17 and school captain Lexie Hope, 18 had all spent the year growing out their hair before it was cut in front of their peers to raise funds for Cancer Council Queensland.

"We are all affected in some way by cancer, and just by cutting off 20cm of our ponytails, we are raising awareness for cancer research and helping someone feel confident in their skin," Lexie said.

"We all felt that the Ponytail Project provided us with the opportunity to bring happiness to the life of someone else and encourage others to give back to the community."

Head of Kennedy House at TAS Kirsten O'Shea said involvement in the Ponytail Project had taught students how to give back to and support their wider community.

"We support our students in these initiatives to develop a

sense of empathy for others," Ms O'Shea said.

This was the third year TAS had supported the Ponytail Project and the ponytails are set to be donated to Sustainable Salons before being made into wigs for people experiencing hair loss due to medical treatment.

Cancer Council Queensland CEO Chris McMillan thanked the students and school for their support.

"It's inspiring to see young people in the Queensland community getting involved in motivational campaigns such as the Ponytail Project," Ms McMillan said.

"Each year in Far North Queensland, 1576 people are diagnosed with cancer. Cancer Council Queensland hopes to reduce this figure, and driven young women like Alana, Lexie and Layla are integral to our mission."

Ms McMillan encouraged other schools in Northern Queensland to get involved in youth-targeted campaigns such as the Ponytail Project.

Year 12s sit first exams

THE first Queensland Year 12s to face the ATAR system have begun sitting their final exams, as classic exam nerves were mixed with a sense of the unknown.

Australian Tertiary Admission Ranking has been introduced in Queensland this year to replace the OP system of ranking students for tertiary admissions.

Trinity Anglican School captain Thaine Wood, who completed his English exam

on Monday along with a cohort of 60 other TAS Year 12s in their first ATAR external exam, said the new system forced them to rise to the challenge with no previous years' experience to draw on.

"As the first students in the new system, we have had no graduated students to calm our nerves and the external aspect also means that our teachers, to some extent, are in the same boat," he said.

"However, I think that the uncertainty has serviced us in our study as we are forced to

consider all possible topics and questions to develop a deep understanding of our subjects."

He said completing the first ATAR exam and graduating in the middle of a pandemic would make the final day all the more triumphant for them.

"Whilst COVID has taken some momentous occasions of the senior year from us all, I feel as though it has also acted upon making us more grateful and caused us to appreciate what we take for

granted," he said.

Far North students have already received their provisional internal assessment marks, which form a proportion of their final result, and will have exams for other subjects spread over the next three weeks.

TAS director of teaching, learning and innovation Tim Manca said they worked hard to ensure students were ready for the exams, with revision seminars and mock exams.

"With the new system, there is an emphasis on exter-

nal assessments written and managed by the QCAA (which) has changed the dynamic for Year 12 students at this time of year," he said.

"I have had experience in other states with the ATAR process and understand how it is used effectively to rank students for university entrance and I think it is the most effective and fair way of allocating university placements."

ATARs are scheduled to be released for Queensland Year 12s on December 19.

Great Cycle Challenge

Congratulations to Kewarra Beach Prep teacher Amanda Lade, who participated in the 'Great Cycle Challenge' for the month of October. She reached her goal of riding 500 km, raising \$1,115, to help fight childhood cancer (thanks to some wonderful donations, including some TAS families). Below you can read more about the Challenge from Amanda:

Great Cycle Challenge started in 2013, and after just six years, the event has grown to become one of the biggest cycling events in Australia. People of all ages, abilities and from every state across the country set themselves a personal riding goal and challenge themselves to pedal throughout October to fight kids' cancer.

This year, bike riders across Australia raised a total of \$6,960,565 – almost 7 million dollars in support of research to develop better treatments and find a cure for childhood cancer, which was fantastic! In six years, our community of 55,774 riders from all six states and two territories have ridden a total of 13,341,418 km, and together we've raised \$16,300,890 in support of research to develop better treatments and find a cure for childhood cancer.

Why? Because cancer is the largest killer of children from disease in Australia. Over 600 Australian children are diagnosed with cancer every year, and sadly, three children die every week.

We're riding to give these kids the brighter futures they deserve, and we believe that any one individual can make their personal impact to fight cancer and save little lives.



The 2020 Academics Reports for students in P–Year 11 will be released via Parent Lounge and Student Café on Wednesday 9 December.




Vertical house groups were then given the opportunity to farewell their Year 12s in themed and personalised whole house celebrations.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies

History teachers across Australia have long been frustrated by the disjointed manner in which the Years 7–10 Australian Curriculum addresses Indigenous history. To ensure that all students leaving TAS graduate with a firm knowledge of Indigenous history, an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies (ATSI) course has been developed. All Year 11 and 12 students will have an ATSI Studies lesson each week. Students will investigate Indigenous ancient history, with an emphasis on the role stories and myths played in their culture, hunting, agriculture and understanding of the land.

Depth studies will then be conducted on post-settlement events such as the Frontier Wars and the impact of protectionist policies that resulted in Indigenous people being placed in missions in North Queensland. With this contextual background, students will move on to miniature inquiries into contemporary issues facing Indigenous people, such as the disparity in educational outcomes, and examine evidence-based methods for alleviating identified disadvantages. The ATSI Studies course is structured as inquiry-based learning, with students learning through the investigation, analysis and evaluation of primary source material, and understanding historical events and the differing viewpoints regarding them.

The preliminary rollout of the course has been received positively, resulting in constructive conversations on often neglected topics.

Stride 4 Stroke – Spread the Word

Twelve months ago, my healthy 13-year-old son experienced a spontaneous dissection of his carotid artery and had a stroke, temporarily taking out the left side of his body.

At 5 am on 21 November 2019, my husband and I found him collapsed at his bedroom door, unable to walk—his left leg no longer supported his weight. As he sat, his entire left side slumped, including his handsome face, which was experiencing facial paralysis (droop). The 000 operator was quick to diagnose with an arm weakness test – only one arm responded strongly – and by asking him to speak. He slurred some words out of the right side of his mouth. He had suffered a STROKE in his sleep.

Within 20 hours, we were medivacked to the ICU unit of the Queensland Children's Hospital. Amazingly, his very clever brain restored him back to full health with rest. We are so fortunate that the part of the brain affected did not impact his daily activities or cognitive function. It has been hard

to reconcile that he is so lucky and yet so unlucky. They only receive a spontaneous case like this every two years in the Children's Hospital.

To commemorate 12 months since this event, and to celebrate his return to full health, I have pledged to run 100 km during November and raise \$2000 for the stroke foundation. However, the real way I need your help is to spread the word.

Year 9 Outdoor Education Programs

Leadership, self-reflection and responsibility

For 18 days in October, our Year 9 students completed a rite-of-passage of sorts through their Outdoor Education Program. This widely known and highly-regarded program has been operating in a similar format for more than 20 years, and with the impact of COVID-19, our students were looking forward to it more than ever. During the program, all students completed both a four-day hike and four-day canoe expedition, two days each of sailing, mountain biking, abseiling and ropes courses, along with orienteering and environmental community service.

The students were guided to lead their own groups as much as possible, and significant personal and group reflection time was also built into the program. Many transferrable life skills were practised and refined, including food preparation and management, organisation, handwashing their own clothes, navigation, leadership and teamwork. When talking with students on the last few days of the program, they indicated that they didn't want camp to finish and that they'd prefer to go home for a few days, eat some fast food and then return to stay longer.

Thank you to the many staff who put in significant time, energy and expertise to make this program possible. These included many support and administration staff at school, 12 teachers, the pastoral care team, senior school leadership, external activity contractors and our contract outdoor education staff. Thank you especially to Miss Beveridge, who single-handedly managed all of the food for the program, along with many other student and staff requirements. Congratulations again to the students on their successful completion of this program, and thank you to the parents for their support of these important programs.

Year 10 Outdoor Recreation

Personal and leadership development program

Term 3 saw students complete a range of rock climbing and hiking activities. These included several days at school on both the bouldering wall and the climbing wall in the Multipurpose Hall, and a day at the fantastic Northern Outlook Climbing Facility in Redlynch. The expedition at the end of Term 3 was to the world-renowned Hinchinbrook Island, completing the 32 km moderate trek over four days.

Term 4 was all about lifesaving and rescue, with students completing their Bronze Medallion Course through the Royal Life Saving Society of Australia. Marty from the QG Air Rescue Helicopter also came to speak to the students about how helicopter rescues work. The end-of-term trip was to Chillagoe for three days for caving activities. The first day was an introduction to moderate-level sport caving and cave navigation. The second day was all about vertical caving, which included two different 27 m abseils into a cave and then laddering back out. The final day was spent exploring part of the longest cave in Queensland, the aptly named 'Queenslander Cave'. During more than five hours underground, the students explored about 5 km of navigable passage in this amazing cave. Students will celebrate the completion of this program at the end of term. Apart from having some amazing outdoor learning experiences and gaining skills in leadership and teamwork, students take away several tangible things, including a school certificate and reference, an electronic logbook with more than 20 days of outdoor experience, as well as Wilderness First Aid and a Bronze Medallion Certificate, both of which are nationally recognised, vocational qualifications.

Applications for the 2021 program were accepted recently from current Year 9 students. Again, there was strong interest in the program, and we look forward to welcoming this new group at the beginning of 2021.

Outdoor Classrooms

White Rock Campus

Both of our school campuses have a large proportion of natural space available for outdoor learning. The Sawpit Gully area at White Rock Campus has been regenerated with more than 10,000 trees over the past 12 years, largely because of the tireless work put in by Mr Rob Pozzi and Mr Mick O'Rielley as the coordinators of this project. Several school events, such as cross-countries and obstathons, have utilised this space in recent years, and this year the Outdoor Education Day programs for Years 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 10 and 11 make ample use of this beautiful space. This was a primer to further develop formal outdoor classroom spaces in the heavily treed area, and the maintenance team at TAS made this happen in October. It just so happened that the International Outdoor Classroom Day was celebrated in Queensland on 5 November, so we were able to use this concept to encourage several classes to try these new spaces. In just one day we saw around 10 classes complete a range of learning activities, including reciting poetry they had written about rainforests, creating bush art, writing poetry with a gothic bush theme (which Year 9 students started during their Outdoor Education Program) and conducting a transect as part of a Year 11 Biology practical. Several other teachers are looking forward to using these spaces for learning experiences in the future.

Sawpit Gully Project

The Sawpit Gully rejuvenation project had its genesis in the original foundation of the school in 1983. Early tree plantings were done by interested members of the TAS community, with ambitions for a more sophisticated planting scheme to commence in 2003.

Since 2009, spearheaded by parents Mick O'Rielley & Rob Pozzi, the project has seen almost 10,000 trees planted by the TAS community, not only to create a wildlife corridor, but also an outdoor educational area where students can study everything from native plants and water quality to carbon sequestration. Due to COVID-19, the area has been used by our Outdoor Education department for continuity of the Outdoor Education Program and applicable learning outcomes where possible. Recently, we invited the TAS community to Sawpit Gully to celebrate the planting of the 10,000th tree.
